Imagine those poor blighters, good enough for neither the Firsts stand nor the Hyraxia Mailer (it's really just a case of us having catalogued way too many books in the last couple of months, and we try to keep the number of books we offer on our mailers within the realms of digestibility).



The books are organised by stock ID, which helps nobody, but means that the first half is cheaper books with more expensive ones generally to the rear (our Firsts cataloguing lump). Nor are authors arranged by surname, something which will perplex and upset a number of you, I'm sure. I'm sure our apologies will more than make up for this. It's quite the mix, you'll see. And, for what it's worth, it still doesn't include everything: we have some set aside for treats in the mailers over the next couple of months.

The best way to order is via the website, as always. Failing that, send an email. Orders through the website will usually be honoured first until we've had a chance to take the book offline.



George Walter Thornbury (1828-1876) was an English poet, novelist, and essayist. He is best known for his literary works, particularly his poetry. Thornbury was also a prolific writer of non-fiction, and he wrote extensively on topics such as architecture, art, and travel. Thornbury published several volumes of poetry including "Songs of Cavaliers and Roundheads" (1857) and "Historical and Legendary Ballads and Songs" (1875). Thornbury's other notable works include "True as Steel" (1863), "Monarchs of the Main" (1855) and "Old and New London" (1872). The volumes are bound in half leather, probably a later binding. Some scuffing to the spines and corners. Internally very nice.









It's such an early work in the genre that it arguably precedes the notion of fiction with Lucian outlining his story as nothing more than a lie (but crediting himself with being honest in that regard, in comparison to his forebears such as Homer). Hickes translated the book from the Greek in the 1600s and never saw his translation in print. The present edition uses Hickes's translation, preferring it over later attempts by North and Holland. It's a wonderful book, illustrated by William Strang (seven illustrations), Aubrey Beardsley (two illustrations) and J.B. Clark (seven illustrations, with an erudite introduction by Charles Whibley. An excellent alternative to the less obtainable 1634 edition. An important book. Boards tanned, some rubbing and bumping to the tips and corners. Internally neat with darkened tissueguards. Offsetting to endpapers. Parallel Greek and English text.
