B. N. O. Walker (Hen Toh) Archive

Walker, Bertrand N[icholas] O[liver] (Hen-Toh) (1870 – 1927). A substantial archive of unpublished writings, including stories, poems, and a Wyandotte glossary. Approximately 280 pages, both manuscripts, typescripts, and corrected carbons, with a 1909 chronotype portrait of Walker by George B. Cornish. Materials generally in very good or better condition. Individually filed in an archival case, 0.5 linear feet.

This archive of stories, poems, and other writings, most of which are unpublished, more than doubles the known corpus of writings by B. N. O. Walker, who published his work under his Wyandotte name, Hen-Toh. Lost for almost 100 years, these manuscripts were recently discovered among the fugitive papers of Charles Marius Barbeau (1883 – 1969), the Canadian ethnologist who relied on Walker's help for his landmark work, *Huron and Wyandot Mythology* (1915).

A. Bound volume

1. Wynandot Notes / Etc. / Glossary, Reporter's notebook with approximately 50 pp. of holograph notes on Wyandot language, history, and genealogy, circa 1921. Partially disbound.

The notebook includes transcriptions of Wyandot names ("Charlotte McKee / Willia holograph manuscript / Wynadot name / Yohn-deh-shu-ress / Gathering sand"), and some colorful vocabulary ("Skenh-shu-ron-noh. What the Wyandot called the Iroquois. A Fox.") There are also family notes on Adam Brown (who, it is revealed, played the bagpipe), and sketches of other individuals ("Tah-tu-Fahn-yoh, Old Man Cobb. Indian doctor. Had his ears cut. Lived out in the bush. ... Always had a wooden bowl of corn soup for visitors." An entry dated 8/26/21 comprises notes on a business committee meeting.

An essay on Mark Twain, one a corrected draft with a typed note at the end addressed to "Peggy," the other a fair copy. We are not 100 percent certain that this essay is by Walker – the corrections here are in red ink instead of pencil, which makes a comparison of the handwriting difficult.
